



Guidance on further submissions

What the UK Border Agency would like to see from your further submission:

<p>NEW, NOT OLD</p>	<p>Further submissions should be based on new material, not repetition of a previous claim or submission, unless there has been a change in legislation, in policy or in case law since your last submission.</p>
<p>BE SIGNIFICANT</p>	<p>The new material should be significant. This means that there should be sufficient information in the new material for there to be a realistic prospect of the UK Border Agency or an immigration judge deciding either that you :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • should be granted asylum, humanitarian protection or discretionary leave, or • should be granted leave on the basis that removal would breach your human rights, or • should be granted leave on the basis of compassionate circumstances.
<p>RELEVANT, NOT IRRELEVANT</p>	<p>The new material should be relevant to you, and the further submissions should explain how the material is relevant to you. Copies of reports from organisations such as Amnesty International or newspapers are not sufficient on their own without an explanation of the relevance to your own case. You could, for example, submit the title and date of a report and reference the part that applies to your own case.</p>
<p>NOT PREVIOUSLY AVAILABLE</p>	<p>Material should not have been available before the most recent decision on your case, whether that decision was an initial decision, an appeal or a decision on previous further submissions, unless there is a good reason why you did not submit the material earlier.</p>
<p>NOW, NOT LATER</p>	<p>Further submissions should be made as soon as is reasonably practicable.</p>
