About this guidance Who can authorise the search Contact	<p>This page tells you who can search for cash and what powers they have to search for cash.</p> <p>Section 289 of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 (POCA) This covers the power to search specifically and with the intention of recovering cash.</p> <p>For more information, see related link: Section 289 of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002.</p> <p>This legislation has now been amended by section 55 of the Crime and Courts Act 2013 to specifically include immigration officers.</p> <p>For more information see related link: Section 55 of the Crime and Courts Act 2013.</p> <p>If you are searching under other legislation Section 289 does not affect cash being seized when a search has been carried out under any other legislation.</p> <p>Under section 294 of POCA you must seize cash if you have reasonable grounds for suspecting it is:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• recoverable property, or• intended by any person for use in unlawful conduct as defined in section 241 of POCA. <p>For more information on this legislation, see related links.</p> <p>Section 24 of the UK Borders Act 2007 and section 55(6) of the Crime and Courts Act 2013 Section 24 of the UK Borders Act 2007 states, chapter 3 of part 5 of POCA applies in relation to an immigration officer as it applies to a constable.</p> <p>For more information on this legislation, see related link.</p>	<p>In this section</p> <p>External links Section 241 of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 Section 289 of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 Section 294 of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 Section 24 of the UK Borders Act 2007 Section 55 of the Crime and Courts Act 2013</p>
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	<p>Section 55 (6) of the Crime and Courts Act 2013 has amended section 24 of the UK Borders Act 2007 in relation to immigration officers searching for cash under POCA for use in 'unlawful conduct'. This now means conduct relating to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• a person's entitlement (who is not a UK national) to enter, transit across, or be in the UK, including conduct relating to any conditions or controls on this entitlement• a relevant nationality act. <p>The relevant nationality acts are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• British Nationality Act 1981• Hong Kong Act 1985• Hong Kong (War Wives and Widows) Act 1996• British Nationality (Hong Kong) Act 1997• British Overseas Territories Act 2002, or• an instrument made under any of these acts <p>For more information, see related link: Section 55 of the Crime and Courts Act 2013.</p> <p>Under section 24 of the UK Borders Act 2007 you have the power to search for cash, if you:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• are lawfully on the premises• have reasonable grounds for suspecting the cash is recoverable property, and• the amount of cash is over the minimum amount of £1000. There is no maximum amount of cash you can seize.	
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Who can authorise the search

About this guidance Search powers for seizing cash	<p>This page tells you who must authorise your search for cash under Section 289 of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 (POCA).</p> <p>Under section 290 of POCA you must get authority to use the search powers in section 289 from either:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• a judicial officer, or• an assistant director (AD) if you are exercising powers under section 24 of the UK Borders Act 2007, as amended by section 55 of the Crime and Courts Act 2013. <p>A judicial officer is either a:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• justice of the peace in England, Wales and Northern Ireland, or• sheriff in Scotland. <p>You must record this authority on a senior authorising officers (SAO) investigative authorisation form, see related link.</p> <p>The authority:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• must be given before you start your search• does not give a power of entry to premises under:<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ POCA ,or○ section 24 of the UK Borders Act 2007. <p>Her Majesty's inspector (HMI) or the senior investigation officer (SIO) must be an authorised officer to authorise cash searches.</p> <p>To become an authorising officer the HMI or SIO must have attended the college of policing (formerly the national policing improvement agency (NPIA)) SAO course.</p>	<p>Downloads Links to staff intranet removed</p> <p>External links Section 24 of the UK Borders Act 2007 Section 55 of the Crime and Courts Act 2013 Section 290 of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002</p>
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	<p>You must write a report to the appointed person if you have not got approval from a judicial officer to search for cash, and:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• you do not find any cash on the premises or subject, or• any cash you seize is not detained for more than 48 hours. <p>The appointed person is a person appointed by the:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Secretary of State in England, Wales and Northern Ireland, or• Scottish Ministers in Scotland. <p>You must detail in the report why you believed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• the powers were exercisable (legal to use), and• it was not practical to get a judicial officer's approval. <p>You must forward the report to the Home Office central authorities unit (CAU). To contact the CAU see related link: Email: central authorities unit.</p> <p>For more information, see related links:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Section 24 of the UK Borders Act 2007• Section 55 of the Crime and Courts Act 2013• Section 290 of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002.
