Category: Clinical attachments and dental observers	
Eligibility requirements	<p>An applicant must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • have graduated from a medical or dental school and intend to do a clinical attachment or dental observer post in the UK • provide documentary evidence of the post which must be <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ unpaid, and ○ only observation and not include treatment of patients • not intend to take employment in the UK • not intend to produce goods or provide services within the UK, including the selling of goods or services direct to members of the public • not intend to do a course of study • maintain and accommodate themselves and any dependants adequately without using public funds • be able to meet the cost of their onward journey • if applying for an extension of leave in the UK they must have previously had leave in this category or leave: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ to take the Professional and Linguistic Assessment Board (PLAB) test ○ as a postgraduate doctor, dentist or trainee general practitioner ○ as a work permit holder for employment in the UK as a doctor or dentist and not have already spent or would spend as the result of a grant of leave more than six months in this capacity.

About this guidance Key facts Entry or extension requirements Granting or refusing Dependants	<p>This section tells you how to check if a person applying for leave to do a clinical attachment or dental observer post meets the requirements to be granted leave.</p> <p>When considering an application you must check:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• the application is valid• the applicant's passport or travel documents are genuine• the applicant meets the substantive requirements of the category• there are no general grounds for refusal. <p>For more information, see related links:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Specified application forms and procedures• IDI – passports & travel documents• General grounds for refusal. <p>Doctors on clinical attachments and dental observers are included in the definition of a 'business visitor' in paragraph 6 of the Immigration Rules. An applicant must meet the requirements of paragraph 75G to 75M of the Immigration Rules. The applicant must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• have graduated from a medical or dental school and intend to do a clinical attachment or dental observer post in the UK• provide documentary evidence of the post which must:<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ be unpaid, and○ only involve observation and not include treatment of patients• not intend to take employment in the UK• not intend to produce goods or provide services within the UK, including the selling of goods or services direct to members of the public• not intend to do a course of study• maintain and accommodate themselves and any dependants adequately:	<p>In this section</p> <p>Switching</p> <p>Links to staff intranet removed</p>
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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ out of resources available to them without recourse to public funds or taking employment, or ○ be maintained and/or accommodated by relatives or friends who can prove they are able and intend to do so, and are legally present in the UK, or will be at the time of their visit ● be able to meet the cost of their onward journey ● if applying for an extension of leave in the UK, have previously had leave in this category or leave: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ to take the Professional and Linguistic Assessment Board (PLAB) test ○ as a postgraduate doctor, dentist or trainee general practitioner ○ as a work permit holder for employment in the UK as a doctor or dentist. <p>Extensions only</p> <p>The applicants must not be in breach of immigration laws, except for any periods of overstaying:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● for 28 days or less which will be disregarded, or ● any period, if the application was submitted before 9 July 2012. <p>For more information, see related link: Applications from overstayers (non family routes).</p>	
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Switching

About this guidance Key facts Entry or extension requirements Granting or refusing Dependants	<p>This page tells you from which categories applicants can switch into the clinical attachment and dental observer category.</p> <p>Clinical attachments and dental observation posts help familiarise overseas doctors and dentists with UK medical or dental practice. They can be done at any stage of the doctor or dentist's career, so applicants can switch into this category if they previously had leave either:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• to do a clinical attachment or dental observer post• to take the Professional and Linguistic Assessment Board (PLAB) test• as a postgraduate doctor, dentist or trainee general practitioner, or• as a work permit holder employed as a doctor or dentist. <p>People with leave in these categories can do clinical attachments or dental observation posts within their existing leave. They only have to apply for an extension under the clinical attachments or dental observation post route if their period of existing leave is due to expire before the end of their clinical attachment or dental observation post.</p> <p>If they are applying to switch the applicant must not have:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• overstayed their previous period of leave by more than 28 days, or• overstayed any period and submitted their application before 9 July 2012. <p>For more information, see related link: Applications from overstayers (non family routes).</p> <p>People in the UK with leave to do a clinical attachment or dental observer post cannot switch into any skilled employment route under the points-based system.</p>	Links to staff intranet removed

About this guidance Key facts Entry or extension requirements Granting or refusing Dependants	<p>This page tells you how to grant or refuse applications made overseas for leave to do clinical attachment or dental observer posts.</p> <p>For guidance on the requirements, see on left: Entry or extension requirements.</p> <p>Entry clearance is not mandatory for these individuals, except for people whose nationality requires them to have a UK visa. For more information on which nationalities require a visa, see related link: Appendix 1 of the Immigration Rules.</p> <p>Grant entry clearance</p> <p>If a person meets all the requirements of paragraph 75G of the Immigration Rules, and paragraph 320 of the general grounds for refusal does not apply you must grant entry clearance. In particular, you must be satisfied the person:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• is a graduate from a genuine medical or dental school• can provide documentary evidence of a clinical attachment or dental observer post which:<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ involves observation only and not treatment of patients○ is unpaid• can maintain and accommodate themselves and any dependants adequately without using public funds• does not intend to take employment during the period of their stay. <p>The endorsement you must use is either:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• C: Clinical Attachment. LTE 3 months. Code 3, or• C: Dental Observer. LTE 3 months. Code 3. <p>Refuse entry clearance</p> <p>If the applicant does not provide the evidence required to show they meet the requirements</p>	<p>In this section</p> <p>Grant or refuse entry at UK port</p> <p>Grant or refuse extension of stay in country</p> <p>Links to staff intranet removed</p>

About this guidance Key facts Entry or extension requirements Granting or refusing Dependants	<p>This page tells you how to grant or refuse entry at a UK port to a person seeking entry to do a clinical attachment or dental observer post.</p> <p>Granting entry</p> <p>If a person meets all of the requirements of paragraph 75G of the Immigration Rules and none of the general grounds for refusal in paragraphs 320 to 321 apply you must grant entry. In particular, you must be satisfied the person:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• is a graduate from a genuine medical or dental school• can provide documentary evidence of a clinical attachment or dental observer post which:<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ involves observation only and not treatment of patients○ is unpaid• can maintain and accommodate themselves and any dependants adequately without using public funds, and• does not intend to take employment during the period of their stay. <p>If a person meets these requirements you must grant leave on code 3 conditions, for a maximum of three months.</p> <p>Refusing entry</p> <p>For more information on refusing entry, see related link: Refusal of leave to enter.</p>	<p>In this section</p> <p>Grant or refuse entry clearance</p> <p>Grant or refuse extension of stay in country</p> <p>Links to staff intranet removed</p>

Grant or refuse extension of stay in country

About this guidance	<p>This page tells you how to grant or refuse applications for leave to remain for people doing a clinical attachment or dental observer post.</p> <p>Grant extension</p> <p>If the person meets all the requirements of paragraph 75K of the Immigration Rules and provided that none of the general grounds for refusal in paragraphs 322 to 323 apply you must grant leave to remain.</p> <p>You must grant three months leave. You must not grant leave that would mean that the person would have more than six months leave in this category.</p> <p>You must grant the person leave on code 3 conditions.</p>	In this section
